SOMETHING ELSE TO CELEBRATE... Unbeknown to us, our school was nominated by Wade Deacon Trust for a National Schools Award for the work we do at Whiston Willis. The nomination was considered by an independent panel and we have been shortlisted from all nominations into the final five schools in the 'School of The Year' category. The final judging takes place in December. We are really proud of all we achieve as a school and the relationships between home and school are key to our successes-so please keep working with us.

Our Parent/ Teacher group met this week to begin to plan some Christmas events for the children to enjoy and they are holding a further meeting on Tuesday 24th October @2.00pm to plan further. We really do need more volunteers to help with this group and if you are available and willing to help, then please contact the school office to say that you would like to attend.

Our Y6 children are making me very proud with the example they are setting around school. They are fulfilling their responsibilities with maturity and pride. We have also developed a Y5 volunteer programme to ensure our Y5 pupils have the opportunity to make a difference to our school too and over 30 children have volunteered some of their time to help other children and staff and make a positive difference to our school community. It is great to see that they have such strong social intelligence and willingness to make a difference.

I have set the children in Y6 a challenge this year to support a number of charities. The challenge is to raise a minimum of £1000 over the full year and contribute really well as good citizens in our community. To start their fundraising, they have decided to support Macmillan Cancer Research and have arranged 3 coffee events for you to support (See separate letter issued) There is a limit to the number of people who can attend each event so please do send in your reply slips to confirm your place.
